MIDDLE STATES ACCREDITATION: THE BASICS

The Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) is a global institutional accreditor recognized by the United States Secretary of Education since 1952. The Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) promotes educational excellence through innovation across diverse institutions.

HOW DOES A SCHOOL BECOME ACCREDITED BY MIDDLE STATES?

Institutions must achieve and sustain compliance with the Commission's Standards for Accreditation, Requirements of Affiliation, policies and procedures, and applicable federal requirements. Accrediting agencies such as MSCHE, have developed evaluation criteria and conduct peer evaluations to assess whether or not those criteria are met. Institutions and/or programs that request an accreditor's evaluation and that meet an accreditor's criteria are then "accredited".

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF MIDDLE STATES ACCREDITATION FOR STUDENTS?

Middle States Accreditation benefits the student by verifying the standard of a school's education so you know you are getting a quality education in your chosen field.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS: LEARNING COMMUNITY INIATIVE

The Learning Community Initiative is in full swing for the Spring semester. The "Nightingales" held their first student-led session. The learning community is a small subgroup of students, belonging to the same cohort, brought together to gain a deeper understanding and integration of course material from each other and support each other towards academic progress. This group is student led with the support of the nursing faculty to examine student's opinions and provide detailed feedback. DENTAL HYGIENE NEWS

In Eastern International College's ongoing commitment to fostering inclusivity and diversity within the school community, the College is thrilled to highlight the strides made by the Dental Hygiene Program in collaboration with the LGBTQ+community and Hudson Pride.

At the heart of EIC's educational mission lies not only the pursuit of academic excellence but also the cultivation of a supportive and inclusive environment where every individual feels valued and respected. Additionally, the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) focuses standards on fostering a humanistic culture (Standards 1-3) while providing graduates with fundamental principles and practice of behavioral science to support patient-centered care in a multicultural environment (Standards 2-16 and 2-17).2

To achieve this, dental hygiene students must work to develop their knowledge of culturally diverse groups to provide effective care. Diversity is no longer limited to race or ethnicity. Diversity is inclusive of mental ability, physical ability, age, race, ethnicity, gender identity, and sexual orientation. 1

In "Oral Health: Advances and Challenges," the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research report, the LGBTQ+ community was identified as an underserved population that faces discriminatory experiences and social stigma, resulting in health inequities and barriers to accessing healthcare. 3 In the course DH 402: Dental Hygiene Care for Culturally Diverse and Special Needs Patient Populations, an emphasis is placed on examining what is meant by culture, how culture intersects with health issues, and how public health efforts can benefit by understanding and working with cultural processes. Recognizing the unique needs and challenges faced by members of the LGBTQ+ community, the Dental Hygiene Program has embarked on a journey to ensure equitable access to dental hygiene care and promote oral health awareness among all individuals, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Over the past 3 years, the EIC Department of Dental Hygiene has actively engaged with the LGBTQ+ community by partnering with Hudson Pride to better understand the specific oral health concerns within the community. Through workshops, seminars, and open dialogues, EIC Dental Hygiene students and faculty have gained valuable insights into the barriers faced by LGBTQ+ individuals in accessing dental care, including discrimination, lack of culturally competent providers, and financial constraints.

Armed with this knowledge, the EIC Dental Hygiene program implemented the collaboration with Hudson Pride starting in 2021 to address these challenges and to work towards improving oral health outcomes among LGBTQ+ individuals. Part of this collaboration has included cultural competency training during DH 402 by inviting Hudson Pride to the College for an annual seminar. On Thursday, March 6th, 2024, Hudson Pride will be back on campus participating in DH 402 and providing the college with free HIV testing.

By actively engaging with the LGBTQ+ community, the Dental Hygiene Program not only seeks to improve oral health outcomes but also to create a welcoming and inclusive environment where all individuals feel empowered to prioritize their health and well-being.

As Eastern International College continues to expand its efforts in promoting diversity and inclusivity, we invite all members of our school community to join in on supporting these initiatives and fostering a culture of acceptance and respect for all.
